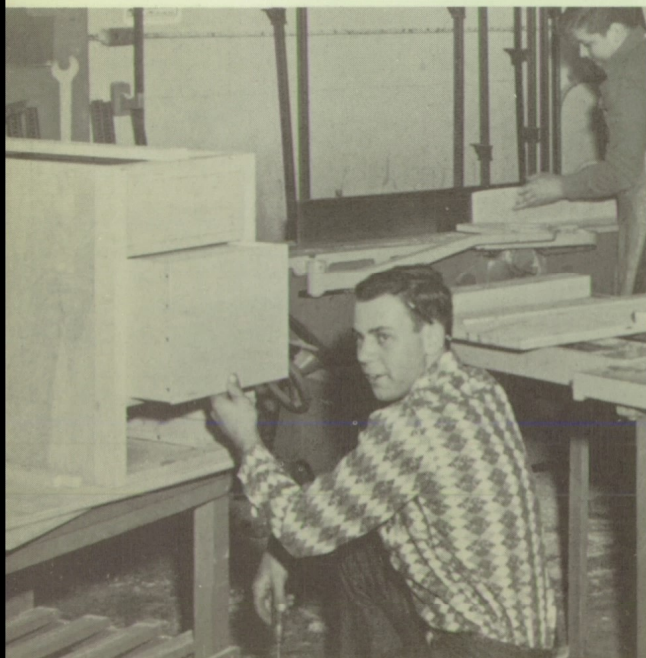

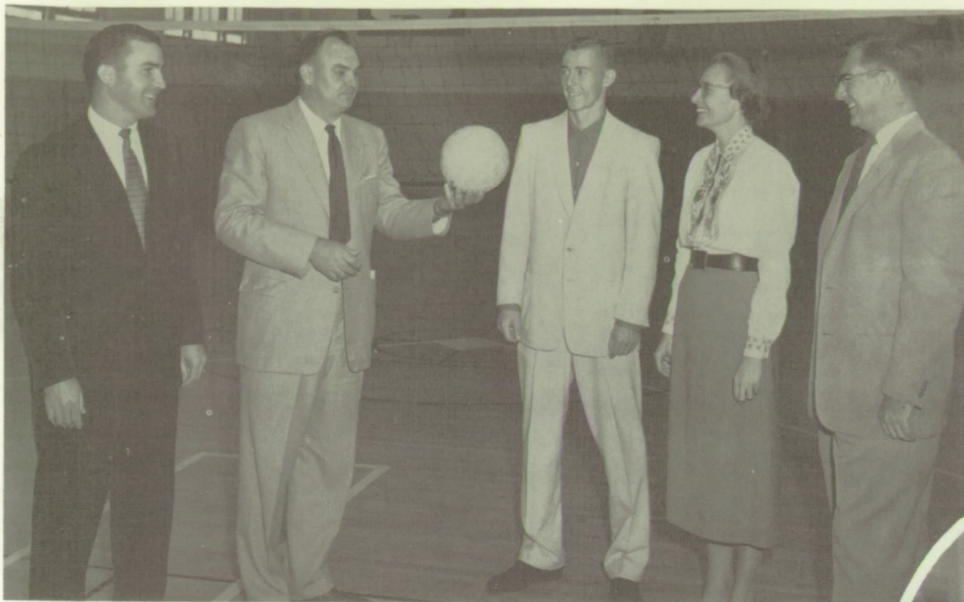

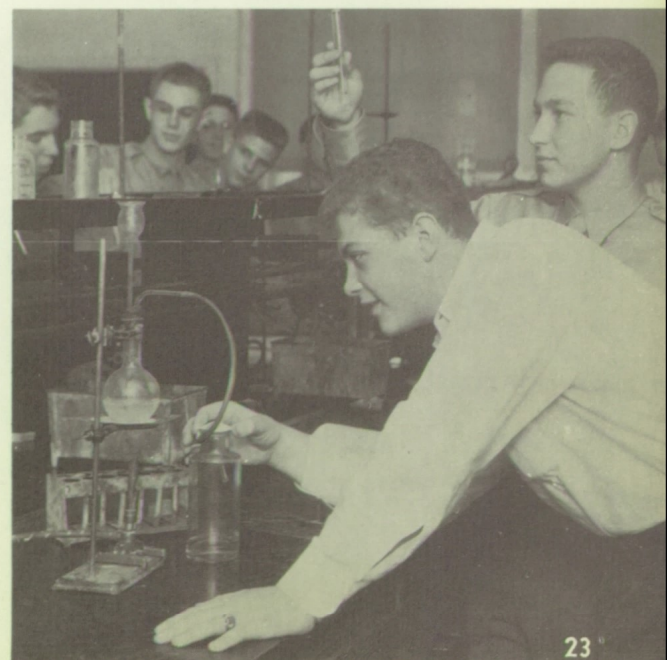

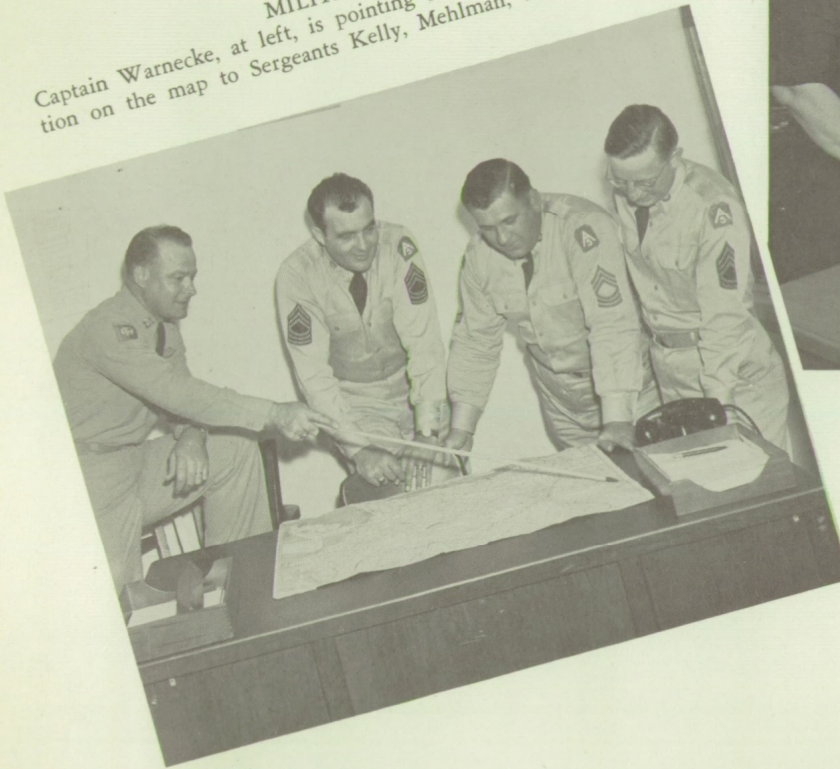

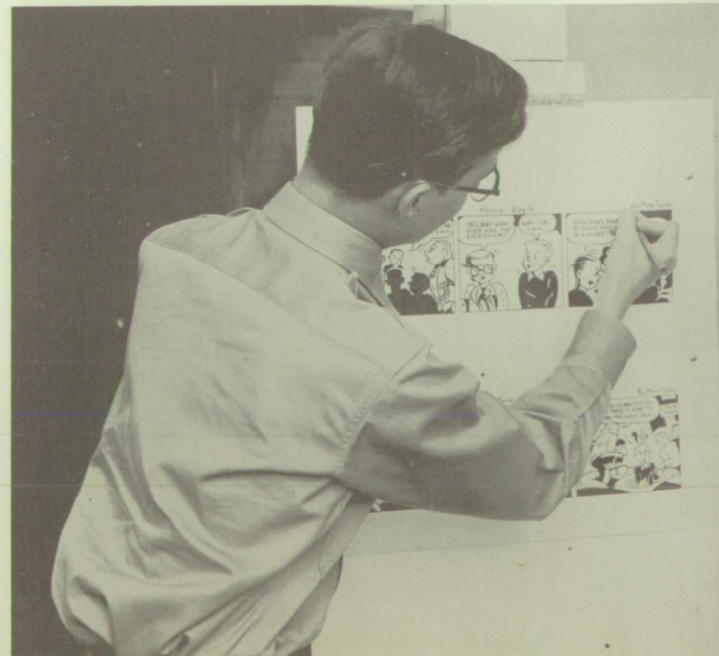

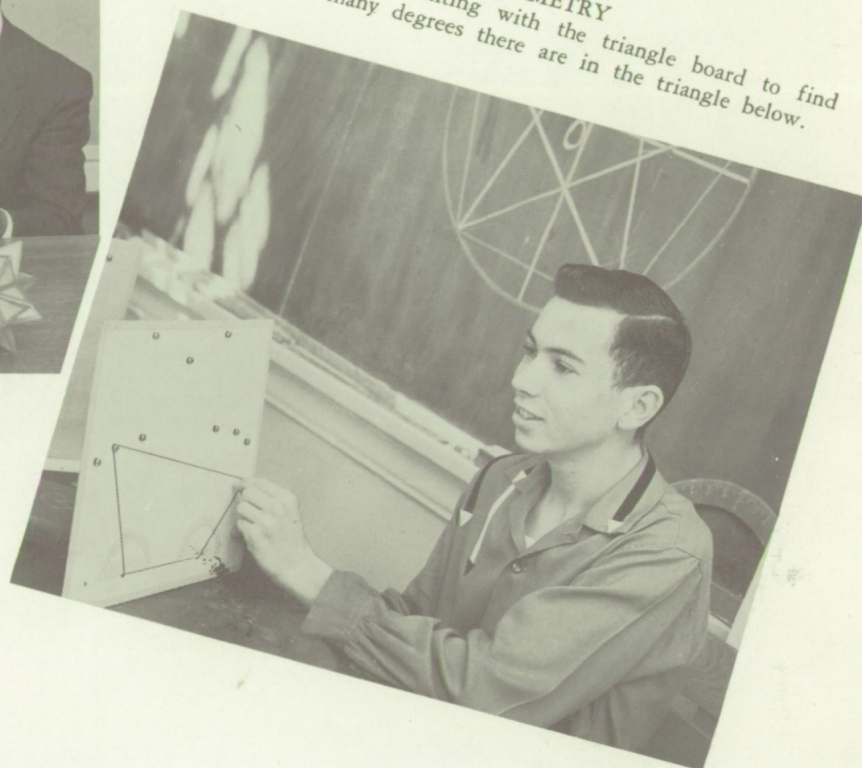

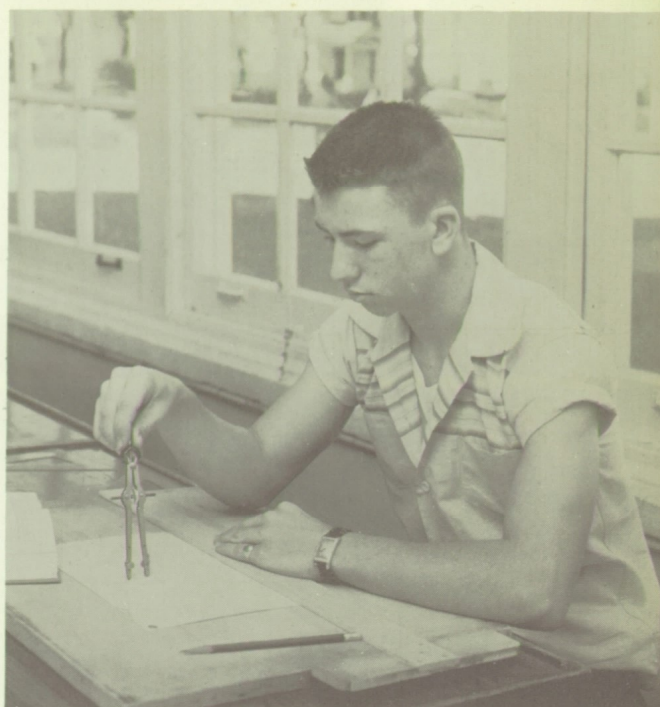

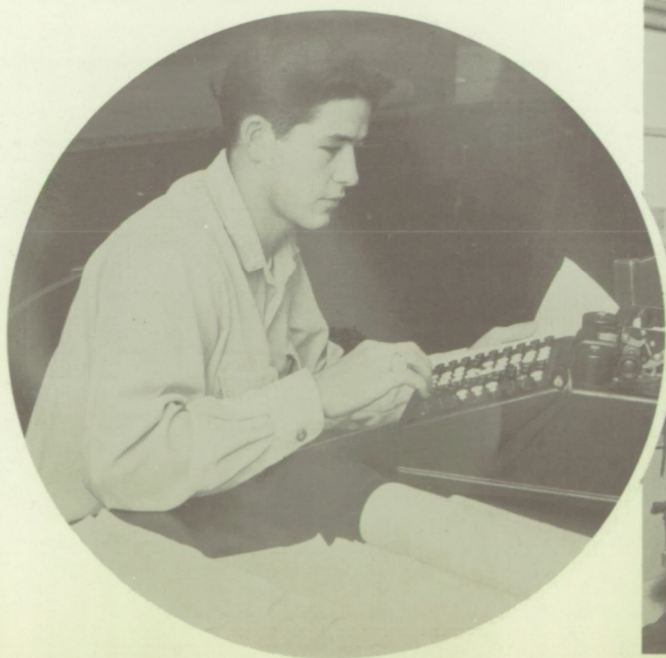

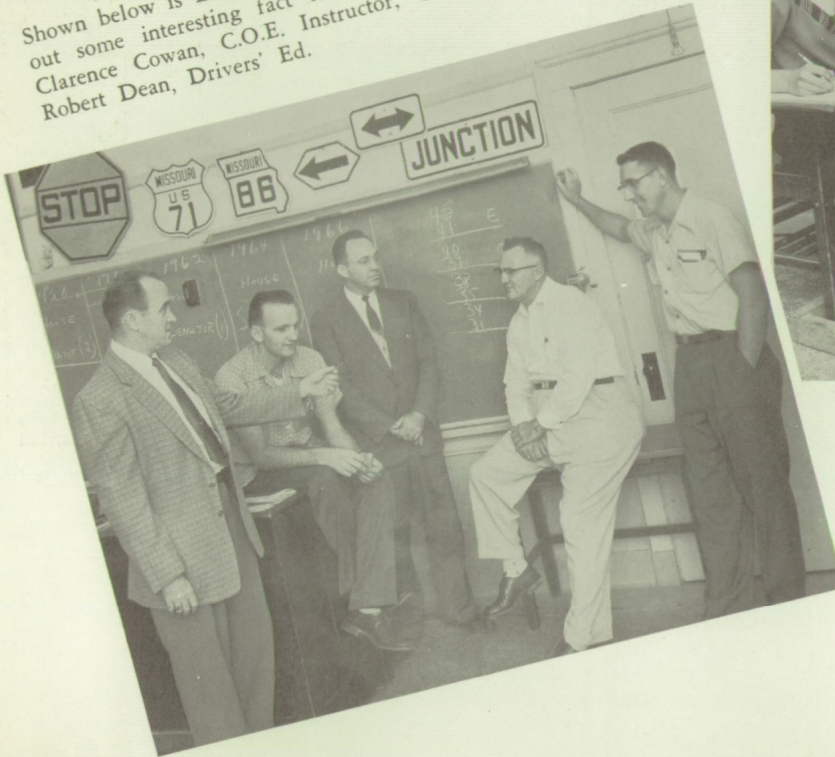

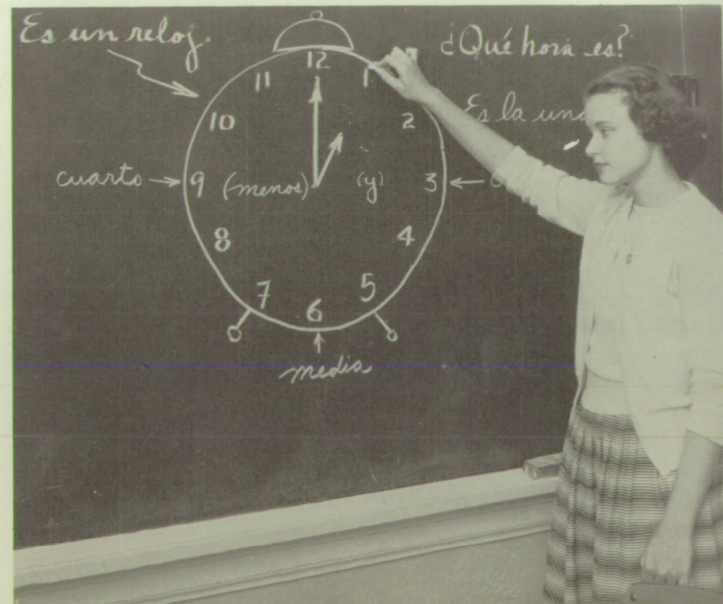

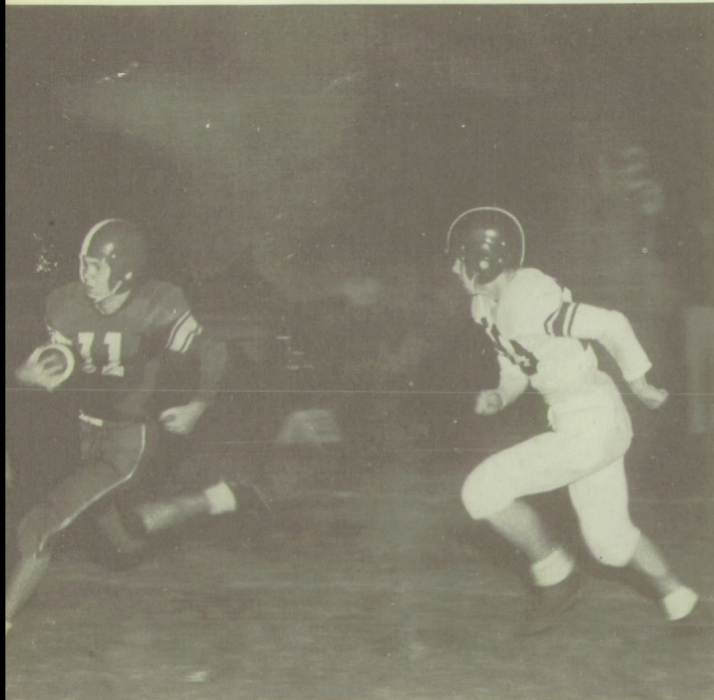

Maupin faked two hand-offs and dashed around right end for the second score. Medcalf, the Joplin wing man, gathered in a pass and drove into the end zone. The Eagles' fourth score was posted when Schrader scrambled 46 yards behind good blocking. Joplin recovered a fumble in the end zone for its fifth touchdown. In the fourth quarter they took the ensuing kickoff and Wilkins scored in two plays for their seventh and final score of the game, making the score 46-20.

Tricky running and surprise maneuvers gave Joplin a 27-6 victory over Fayetteville at the second annual Homecoming game, October 28. There was rugged smashing from both sides, but quarterback Ron Maupin, made some good gambles good as the Eagles completed six of eleven pass attempts for 92 yards, one of them good for a touchdown. 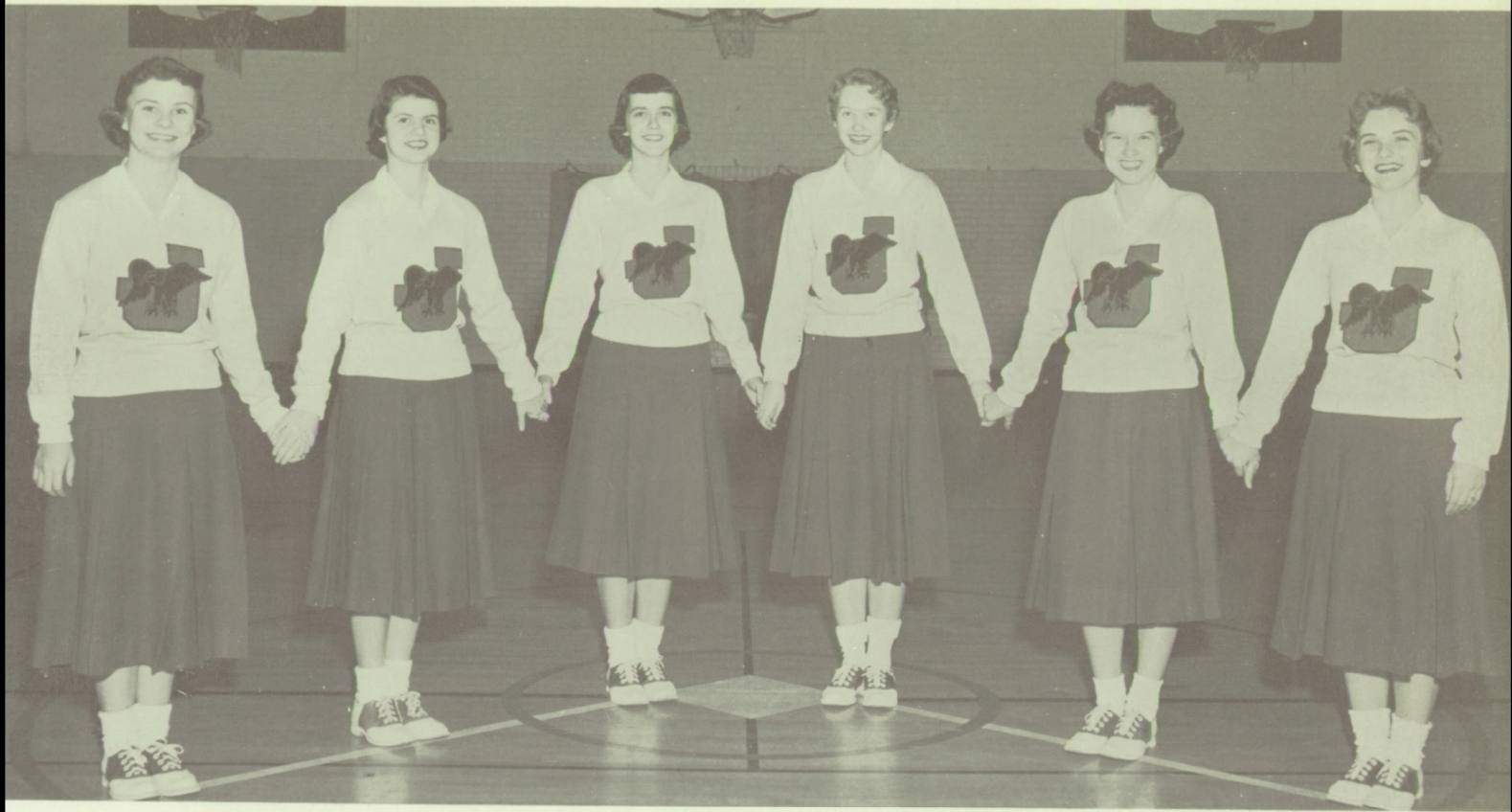

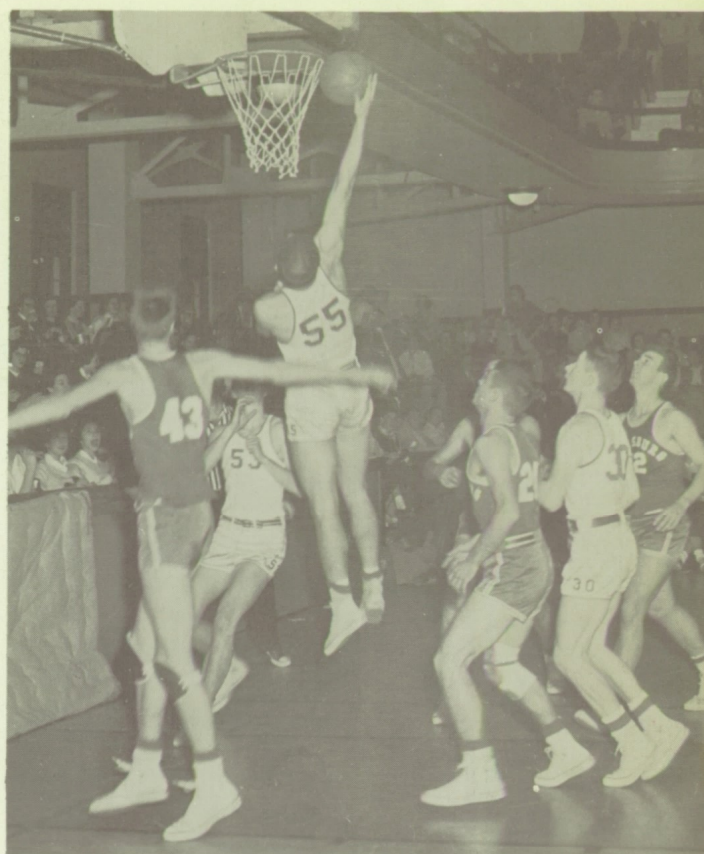
Joplin Eagles Win 22, Lose 2

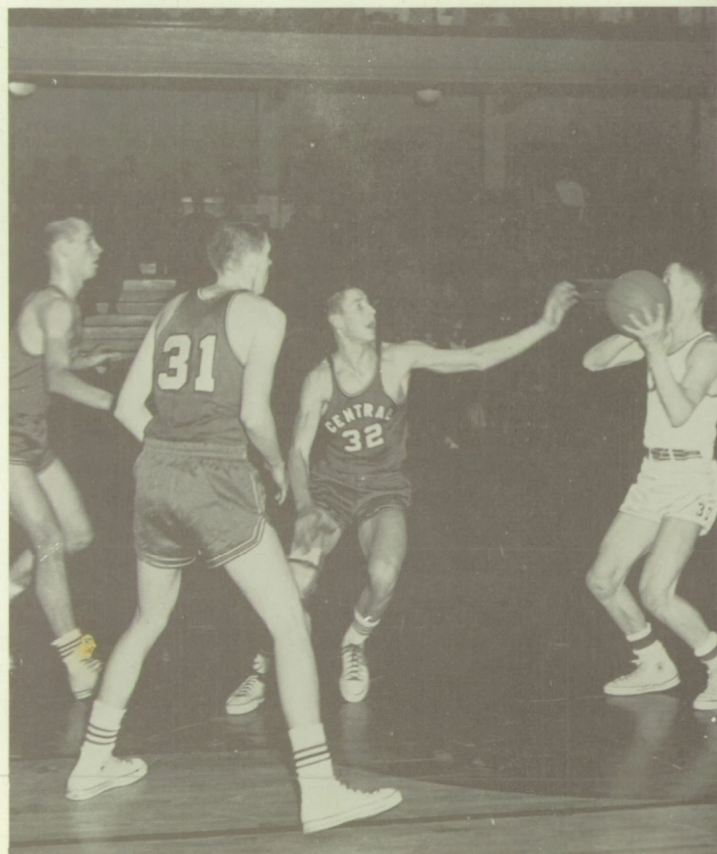

The game was knotted five times with J.H.S. building up a 37-29 lead at the half, only to have Lebanon come from behind in the last two periods to catch up. But the Joplin Eagles kept on their toes and in the last tense minute of play, fought hard and won by the narrow margin of three

points. With Jim Dailey, Eagle playmaker, pacing the Red and Green with sixteen points, the Eagles bested the Lamar Tigers by a 69-45 margin. During the second period, the Kaminskymen got hot, taking a half-time lead of 27-14 and a 53-25 lead at the end of the third session, and adding to their lead in the final quarter of play. Joplin defeated the Branson Quintet by a narrow margin of only six baskets. The final score of this hard-fought battle on the hardwoods was 64-58. 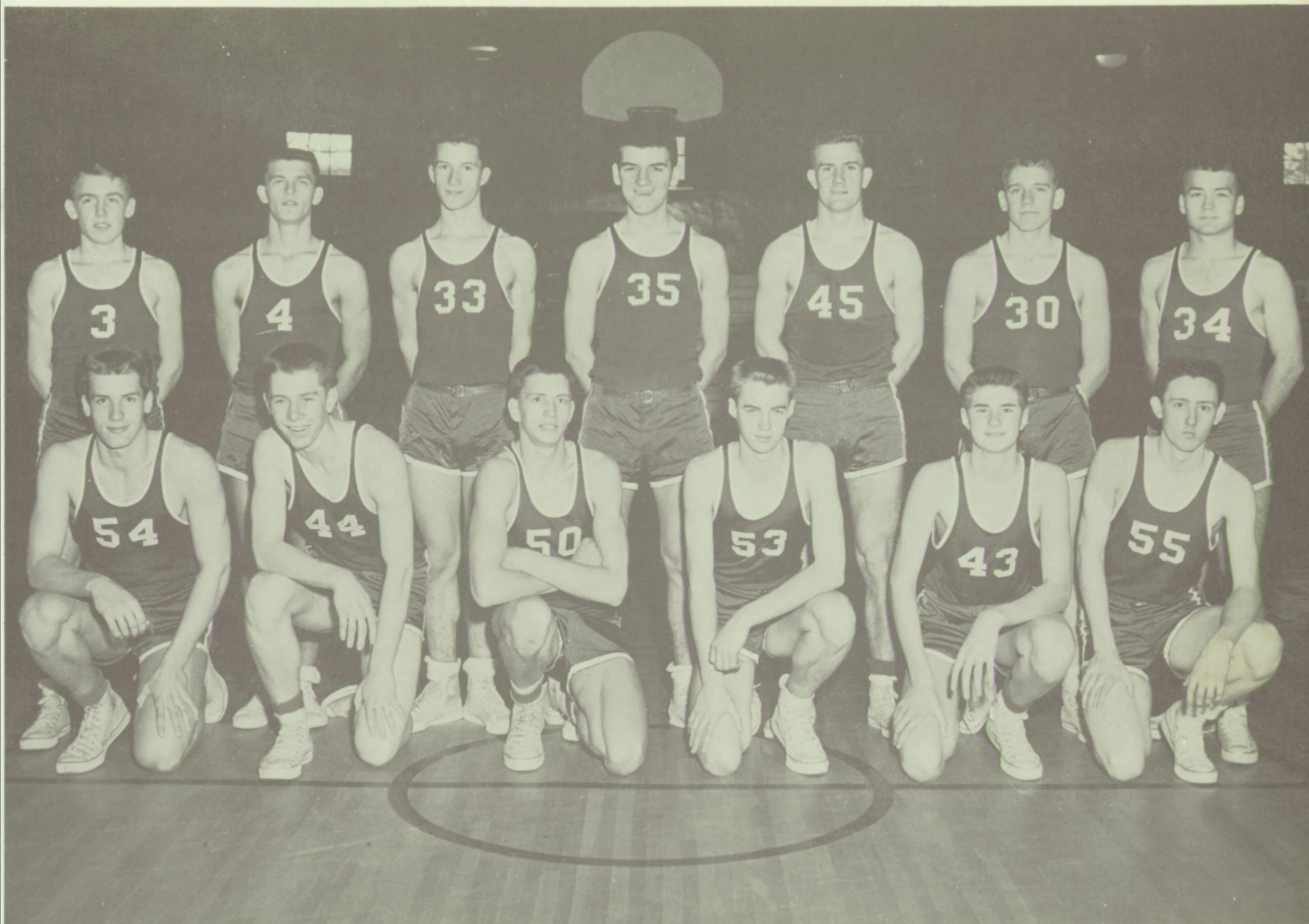
All in all the 1956 basketball season was one to be proud of and we say hats off to the hard-working, deserving team!

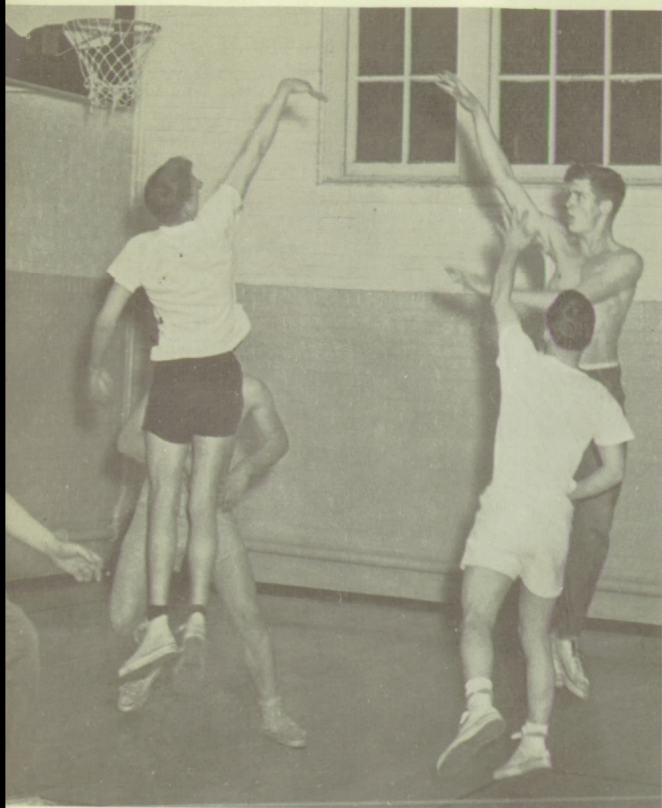

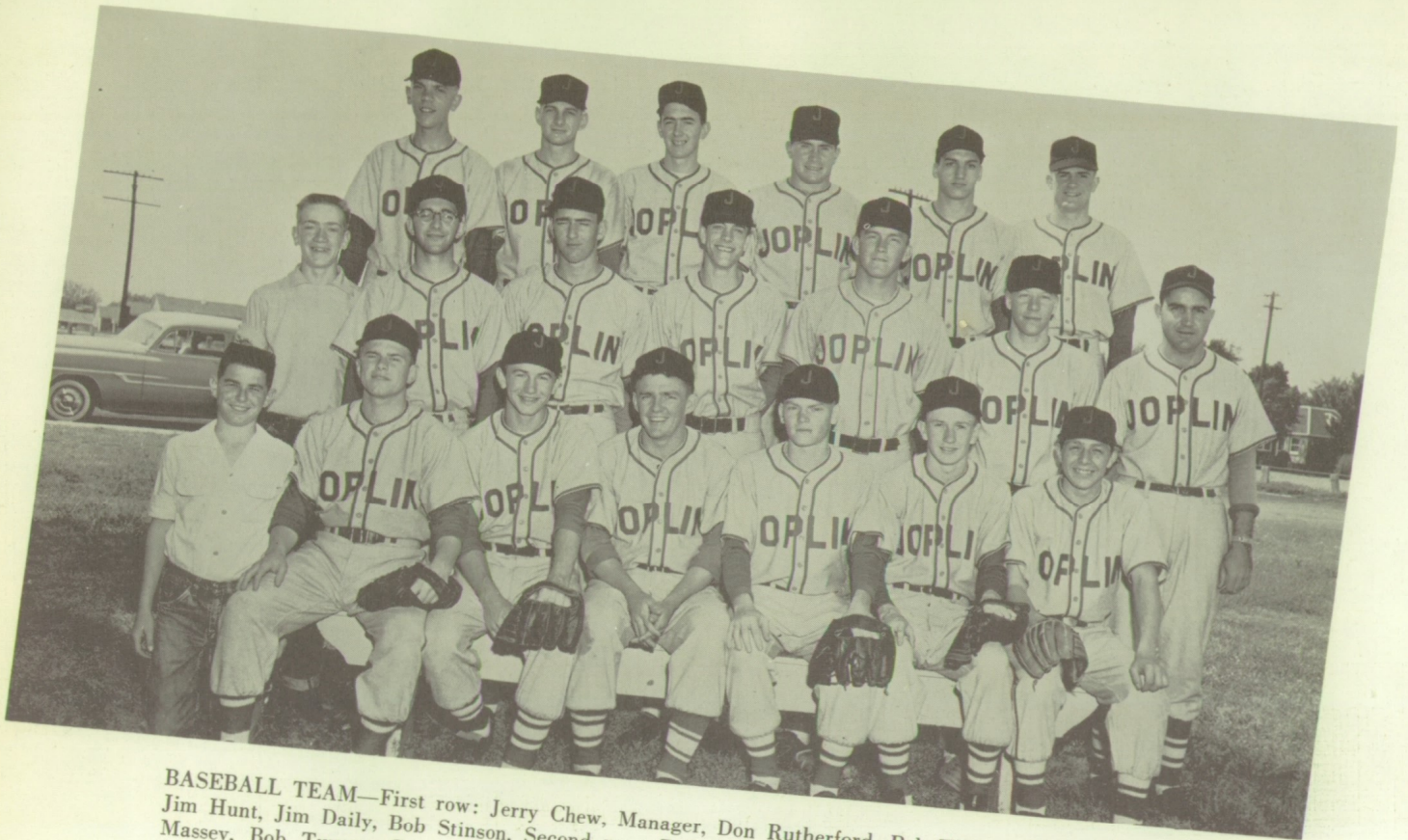
