














#### Tokens of summer




#### Diversion-


presentations, posters, and films enlightened the Language Arts classes. Students expressed individuality and originality through compositions and term papers.



gradually gained new meaning as foreign language students learned basic vocabulary and sentence structure. Oral and written exercises, verb conjugations, pantomimes, and art work added adventure to the usual routine of classwork.

While first year students coped with the basic mechanisms of their respective languages, students mastered verb tenses and idioms in their second year.

Advanced Spanish and French, introduced last year, stressed verbal fluency and a more complete knowledge of the literature, drama, and music of their particular language. A study of Latin gave students a background knowledge for modern languages.



patience as the weeks sped by in Driver's Education and R.O.T.C. departments. Special skills acquired by these classes proved to be an advantage to many students.






### Girls threatened


and pulses quickened as area students strived to develop skills at the Franklin Technical School. Assisted by instructors, vocational students gained needed experience for further improvement.




Striving








The freshman squad made several impressive victories over opponents with a season record of five wins and one tie.






#### Winter months
